IGF coordination

- IGF secretaritat
- MAG (Multistakeholder Advisory Group)
 - whose aim is to advise UN SG on Internet governance related issues
 - members are 50 individuals coming from all over the world and various stakeholder groups with diverse expertise, experience
 - CARNET has its representative in MAG
- IGF has no decision-making mandate, but can still inform, inspire and influence decision makers when forming an attitude or public policy
- Parliamentarian session recently introduced in IGF

Legal

copyright, arbitration, labor law, computer crime, digital signature

Economic

e-commerce, e-currencies, market regulation, e-banking, customs, consumer protection

access to internet infrastructure and services, technology transfer

Sociocultural

education, multilingualism, privacy protection, content control, human rights
